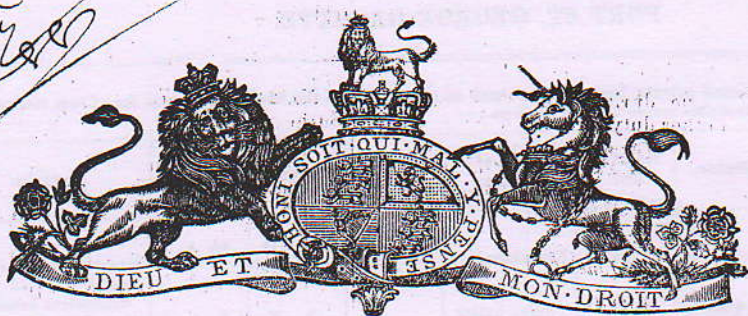

#### LEAVE.

No. 233.—His Excellency the Governor in Council is pleased, under the XXIV and XXV Victoria, Cap. 67, section 26, to grant the Honorable Mr. C. G. Master, c.s.i., an Ordinary Member of the Council of the Governor of Fort St. George, leave of absence on medical certificate for a period of two months, with effect from the 2nd instant.

No 182.—His Excellency the Governor in Council is pleased to declare, under the provisions of section 16 of the Madras Forest Act (V of 1882), that, from 1st September 1888, the area, the boundaries of which are set forth in the schedule appended to this notification, will be constituted a reserved forest.

#### SCHEDULE.

Area 3,200 acres.	<p><i>Situation.</i>—Denkanikottai forests, on the slopes both sides of the Kunthukottai, road four miles south of Denkanikottai.</p> <p><i>Boundaries.</i>—From the top of the ghat road, a demarcated line westwards to near Noganur survey field 267 (tank), then to Alamarathukuttu, then over to a stone with "Kariyappa Nayaken's" name chiselled on it, then to Papanna Cheruvu aggu, then across to Avulu manthi gooddai, then up to the ridge of Chakala gooddai, then over two rocky hillocks above Ba-ari maram kuttai (tank), then to a hillock at the junction of Honneya Gounden Bavi Vanka, with Karandahalli Vanka, then across the stream to the right bank and southwards along the path from Yelasetti to Karandahalli, then up to a saddle below the deserted Gollahalli hamlet, then across to a hill south of deserted Chikkamalasalai hamlet, thence the line goes southward to the path from Malasonai to Karandahalli, and along the path down to a Puchchali tree.</p> <p>From the above tree the line runs east by southwards to Thinnehola Bandi in Karandahalli, then across Thevalugan's patta land eastward to Bonuhalla boundary, then eastwards to Karikallu gooddai in Matamathikerai, then on to Basuvappana kuttai (tank). From the above tank the line runs south-eastwards to a rock near field No. 191 in Matamathikerai, then to near the 4th mile stone. On the road from Denkanikottai to Ancheti, then to Gadda Thimmanu Gudde, then across to Karikal Gudde in Andivanapalli, then across to Kariyeni Gudde in Aluhalli, then on to Samalubanda in Aluhalli, then on to the foot of Muthirayankonda, then eastward across to the western hill of Guliekonda. From here the line runs to the eastern hill of Guliekonda, then descends east by southwards over a ridge to Guliehalla, then to a Puchchali tree on the path from Aluhalli to Sandanapalli, then along the path to Sandanapalli cultivation, then northwards to Chikkadone Alamaratha Bande, then across to Kallu Gudde, then across to Mattumunthe Bande in Tadesur, then across to Muthur Anuman Kovilparai in Pethihu Aththikottai, then to Pethihu Aththikottai cultivation, thence north-westward to the brow of the hill, then southward to Addayeni, then to Mathigana Bandi. From here the line runs south-westward to a hillock near field No. 347 in Kottai Muchandram, thence westwards to a rock near a Puchchali tree, then up to Karikaliyeni Gudde in Maragattam, then down to field No. 249 of Periya Betarayan's patta, then on to the starting point on the road from Denkanikottai to Auchetti. The line has been demarcated throughout.</p>

REMARKS.—Property right over the land and trees comprised in the portion of the District Board's road from Denkanikottai to Kunthukottai passing through the reserve for 100 yards in length and 44 yards in width, viz., 22 yards in width on each side of the road from the centre, which is equal to 10½ acres, is admitted on behalf of the District Board, Salem.

I. Right of way is allowed for men, cattle and packanimals over the undermentioned paths in the block, none to exceed six yards in width.

II. From Alahalli to Denkanikottai via Kotamuchandiram running northwards from Alahalli through the reserve for one mile.

III. From Tavarakarai to Andevanahalli running north and south across the reserve for some two and odd miles. Right of way is allowed for men only over the following paths to a width not exceeding three yards.

IV. Path from Thadasur to Alahalli via Giriyanahalli running south west from the former for about a mile within the reserve.

V. Path connecting Malsonai with Tavarakarai, which runs north-east from the former place for half a mile through the reserve.

VI. Right of way is given to the undermentioned temples for men only to a width not exceeding three yards. The temples Nos. 2, 1, 5 and 6, with a margin of ten yards and temple No. 1 with a margin of 22 yards round them for preparing offerings by fire are excluded from reservation.

1. Jonai Guddai Munishveran kovil, situated a mile west of Thadasur on a small hill and consisting of a god under a tree. About 100 persons attend the annual festival in January and February. Water is obtained from the perennial spring close at hand.

2. Muthurayanagudi, a god on a platform situated a mile north-west of Alahalli on the path to Noganur.

3. Munishveran kovil, situated three-quarters of a mile south of Tavarakarai. The temple consists of a platform under a tree and is attended by ten persons at a time. No fire for preparing offerings, &c., is kindled there.

4. Pudu Muniswaraswami kovil, situated some thirty yards east of the public road No. 1 above near the fourth mile stone from Denkanikottai. There is a building, but no regular festival; some sixty persons attend at a time and water is taken from the temple well. A path from the public road leads to the temple.

5. Godi Muthurayaswami temple, situated a quarter of a mile east of No. 4 temple on a stone platform. There is no regular festival; some twenty persons attend at once and water is obtained from a pool close by or from Andanahalli tank, whence the path leads to the temple.



6. Bilikal Munishwaraswami kovil, quarter of a mile north of Mattamathikarai and half a mile west of the public road. The temple is within a building and is attended by some one hundred persons at no fixed dates. Water is taken from a well on a patta land close by. The path to the temple goes from Mattamathikarai. The under-mentioned private lands are kept as enclosures within the block free from reservation and with reasonable access allowed to them.

No. 149.—Under section 2, Act I of 1870 (Canals and Ferry Act), His Excellency the Governor in Council is pleased to declare that the provisions of the above Act shall apply to the undermentioned ferry in the Cuddapah district; and, under section 14 of the said Act, to fix the following scale of fees payable for the conveyance of passengers, goods, carriages, carts, palanquins and animals across such ferry:—

*Ferry Rules framed under Section 22, Act I of 1870.*

1. The ferry rules and English and vernacular tables of fees and tolls leviable from passengers, &c., shall be exhibited in conspicuous places on either side of the ferry at all times when the ferry is worked.

2. The boatmen shall have boats and rafts in readiness at either side of the ferry, and shall take care that mails, travellers and passengers are not unnecessarily delayed, whether by day or night, but are ferried over with expedition.

3. The Revenue officer of the division or any other officer deputed by the Collector or Divisional officer to superintend the working of the ferries, shall determine the gross weight which each boat can safely carry, and keep the ferry servants duly informed of the same. The latter shall be made to understand that infringements or evasions of the rules will render them liable to fines of Rs. 50, and Rs. 5 a day for continued infringement.

4. Every passenger crossing a ferry is allowed to carry with him his luggage, not exceeding in

weight an Indian maund, without any additional fee for the same. Any quantity of luggage in excess of the above will be liable to an additional fee of one anna for each Indian maund or less.

5. No fee or toll shall be demanded in the cases enumerated below:—

- (a) Government mails, stores and remittances, and all persons, animals and vehicles employed in carrying the same.
- (b) All Government officials (including troops) travelling on duty, and also, in the case of Police officers, prisoners and property in their custody.
- (c) All parties employed by Government servants to carry official reports when so carrying such reports.
- (d) Children under 10 years of age.

6. Prosecutions for any infringement of the rules shall not be instituted in any Criminal Court except under the sanction of the Collector of the district.
