**Sub: Diversion of 1165.66 ha (including 91.331 ha underground area) of forest land for construction of Etalin Hydro Electric Project (EHEP) (3097 MW) in Dibang Valley District of Arunachal Pradesh by M/s Etalin Hydro Electric Power Company Limited, Arunachal Pradesh.**

Sir,

I am directed to refer to this Ministry's letter of even number dated 09.06.2020 requesting to provide the following information as sought on the recommendation of Forest Advisory Committee (FAC) meeting on 23.04.2020:

- i. State Government shall submit cost benefit ratio analysis (C/B ratio) for the project as per the latest Guideline of the MoEFCC. The Regional Office of MoEF&CC, Shillong will be associated with the analysis exercise.
  - ii. State Government shall submit details of the forest area including the KML files, which FAC sub-committee had recommended to be surrendered /reduced.
  - iii. The area is rich in bird life (230 bird species have been recorded by WII). State Government will therefore, review if trees marked for felling could be left as such, at least in the reservoir area, as dried trees could also be used as bird habitat.
2. In addition to above, the Ministry vide email:fcdivision100@gmail.com dated 29.05.2020 and 30.05.2020 forwarded various representations received in the Ministry regarding concern over the implementation of the project on forest land and requesting for rejection of Etalin Project. Some of the representations further received in the Ministry are also attached herewith for your ready reference.

In view of above, the State Govt. of Arunachal Pradesh is requested to kindly examine the representations thoroughly and take concrete action in the matter, and thereafter furnish their response alongwith the requisite information as sought on the recommendation of FAC vide this Ministry's letter of even no. dt 09.06.2020 as referred for further consideration of this proposal in the Ministry.

**Subject:** Concerns about the Etalin Hydro-Electric Project (3097 MW) as an Arunachal Pradesh State Wildlife Advisory Board member and Idu Mishmi resident of Dibang Valley

To the Respected Members of the National Tiger Conservation Authority,

I write to you in my capacity as a member of the Arunachal Pradesh State Board for Wildlife and a member of the Idu Mishmi community. Scientists from Wildlife Institute of India (WII) have found that Dibang Valley has more tigers than any other tiger reserve in Arunachal Pradesh. These tigers are found everywhere in Dibang Valley. Idu Mishmi community's unique bond of brotherhood with tigers is now known globally to have conserved Dibang Valley's tigers. I wish to submit to you my opposition to the Etalin Hydro Electric Project in specific, and other mega dams planned in my home-state of Arunachal Pradesh, as our area of Dibang Valley area will be particularly affected.

1. *Our special relationship with tigers:* In Idu Mishmi culture, we believe that Nani Ekomeya, our ancestral mother, gave birth to two brothers, a tiger and a shaman. We believe that both are the protectors of our people. Our Nani Ekomeya divided flora and fauna in equal parts amongst the two brothers, and the vast area of the Mishmi Hills (of which Dibang Valley is a part) is shared equally by people and big cat species. This is why we also believe that tigers never kill humans intentionally and vice-versa. In case a tiger is killed by accident we perform a village ritual equivalent to human funeral rituals. Our community forests, mountains and rivers are home to uncountable living creatures. Since time immemorial our community has managed and protected these lands. We are strongly bonded to nature and are looked after by the spirit master, Gölō, who lives in the high mountains.



2. *A unique culture-based tiger conservation model:* We Idu Mishmi do not kill tigers; it is for us a grave sin. Many of our people decline outsider offers of great sums of money in return for tiger parts because we simply do not kill who we consider our 'brother'. Despite financial, emotional, spiritual and psychological stress of livestock depredation, we Idu Mishmi do not rush to retaliate immediately after the loss of small numbers of mithun, our semi-domesticated livestock, to tigers. My Idu Mishmi community and I strongly believe that the right conservation strategy for Dibang tigers would be to develop a new kind of a conservation plan that is built not with fences and armed patrol guards, but around an Idu Mishmi cultural model, a culture which has so far proven to be effective in saving the tiger. It will allow both the tigers and the Idu to retain their ancestral land – Dibang Valley, from its valley bottoms to mountain slopes to high peaks.
3. The Talō (or Talon, incorrectly written as Tangon in official documents ) river is sacred to our Idu Mishmi community. In Idu cultural belief, the souls of our dear departed are guided along the river by Idu Mishmi shamans to reach the heavenly abode. Thus, the Talō is essential to our mythology and beliefs. We do not wish to see our soul river dammed and obstructed as it will be detrimental to our Idu belief system and cultural values.
4. The total population of the Idu Mishmi community is less than 15,000 individuals. We are a minority tribal group and the Dibang Valley is our homeland. We are conscious that the Etalin Project will bring hundreds of migrant workers to the Valley, in one government sub-committee report, the number is as high as 11,000 workers. I fear that this will dilute and threaten the unique cultural integrity of our society.
5. Despite mass protests from our community, India's biggest dam - Dibang Multipurpose Project (2880 MW)- has already been approved on the Dibang river. Our sentiments on this matter were disrespected and the project was approved under the false guise of "development" and "economic boom" and our resistance was crushed. It is unethical for the government to force another mega dam on the same river in our homelaand. Between both dams it is expected that 6.1 lakh trees will be cut down. With the destruction of the Dibang Valley, where will my community go and what will be left for our future generations?



6. We are now aware of the burning issue of climate change and its impacts. Reputable independent experts and scientists have warned against clearing the Etalin Project on the grounds of natural disaster risks of all these hydel projects. We appeal to you to not risk the safety and welfare of our community, the wildlife and tigers it support, and our ancestral land in general. India has already seen the destruction caused when ill-planned development projects, especially along rivers, are faced with extreme weather events. These are becoming more extreme due to climate change.

We are a minority tribe that is closely bonded to our homeland and we share a unique brotherhood with tigers. I appeal to each esteemed member of the NTCA to spare the natural beauty, biodiversity, cultural integrity of my homeland, and encourage the cultural model of community-based conservation proposed by my community in the Dibang Valley. This will also allow us to share our learnings and pride with the government of other tiger range states, the people from other areas and also with our own future generations. I hope the members of this esteemed body will realize that we have the opportunity here to set the stage for a new type of tiger conservation, which is based upon strengthening local cultural values. For but this to happen, we must first stop the permanent destruction the Etalin Project and other mega-hydel projects in Dibang Valley will bring to both the Idu Mishmi and the tigers.

Respected member of the Forest Advisory Committee,

I write to you as a concerned citizen of India and implore you to reject the forest clearance for the Etalin Hydropower project. The project should not be viewed as a clean energy project as it involves the destruction of a minimum of 2,70,000 trees in the Dibang Valley of Arunachal Pradesh. The Dibang Valley lies in a global biodiversity hotspot and its old-growth forests are irreplaceable. They harbour rich species diversity, including a unique high-altitude population of tigers.

Such forests are also crucial to public health and our fight against the climate crisis. In a letter by the Ministry of Environment Forests, Climate Change to the Ministry of Corporate Affairs, Environment Secretary CK Mishra acknowledges that there is a consensus amongst scientists that a rise in zoonotic diseases like Nipah, avian influenza, Zika, and Coronavirus is linked to loss of biodiversity and forests. Once lost, such complex ecosystems are irreplaceable. the Dibang multipurpose project has already been approved on the same Dibang river. It would be a tragedy if the Etalin project is approved too.

I urge you to unanimously reject clearances for the Etalin Project.

**Sub: Urgent Request to reject the FAC sub-committee recommendations on Etalin HEP proposal****Ref:** (1) Minutes of the FAC Meeting dt. 23.04.2020 through VC

(2) Agenda No. 3, F.No. 8-20/2014-FC

(3) Our submissions on the Forest Clearance process dt. 28.09.2011, 09.07.2013, and 28.09.2016.

This submission is in continuation of various representations and comments cited at (3) that some of us have submitted to the Ministry over time on strengthening the ecological basis of the forest clearance process. The signatories to this letter are active conservationists and/or former members of statutory committees, with a clear understanding of the forest clearance process, including related legal and scientific aspects of forest conservation. We also hold a pragmatic view on the need to balance conservation imperatives with development aspirations based on knowledge driven solutions. We are therefore presenting our views after due analysis, with full responsibility and in the supreme national interest.

We have very carefully studied various aspects pertaining to the Etalin HEP and are deeply concerned about the recommendations of the sub-committee of the FAC recorded in the minutes cited at (1) above, that – *"The project may be allowed subject to the condition that the financial outlay of Wildlife Conservation Plan be deposited to Forest Department by User Agency"* on the basis of a Wildlife Study done by WII which – *"...is accepted in toto..."*

Based on our analysis of published data and peer reviewed scientific principles of landscape ecology, we submit that the sub-committee of the FAC appears to be ignoring established tenets of forest conservation



and related legal issues while recommending this proposal, which is highly destructive, and the impacts of which **cannot be "mitigated"**. This may be tantamount to a breach of the FAC's constitutional and statutory duty to conserve forests.

Fundamentally, the objects of the Forest (Conservation) Act, 1980, (69 of 1980), which was enacted in furtherance of the Constitutional obligations of the Central Government under Article 48-A, is to ensure protection of forests and wildlife, and not just clearance of projects by imposing standard conditions and compensatory afforestation. The Supreme Court, in 2003 AIR (SC) 3240 (3 judges), has held that – *"We cannot shut our eyes to the statements made in Article 48-A of the Constitution of India which enjoins upon the State to protect and improve the environment and to safeguard the forests and wild life of the country. What is destructive of environment, forest and wild life, thus, being contrary to the Directive Principles of the State Policy which is fundamental in the governance of the country must be given its full effect" ...*

This interpretation has been reiterated in a catena of Judgments by the Apex Court, which you are all well aware of. Thus, as members of the FAC, you are under a legal obligation to conserve forests and wildlife. The FAC, being a statutory committee, has a duty to conserve forests, and not merely to mechanically grant permissions, even to such destructive proposals, under the pretext of development. By glossing over crucial facts, and by accepting untenable submissions in reports submitted by WII, the User agency and State forest officers, the FAC is doing a grave disservice to the larger interests of the nation, i.e., its ecological security.

In order to substantiate the submissions made above, we present the following facts and data for your kind consideration –

i. That the FAC continues to ignore the biggest threat to forests – **Forest fragmentation**—resulting from ill-planned intrusion of developmental projects into contiguous landscapes with natural forests. Peer reviewed research has clearly established that the effects of fragmentation are highly deleterious to biodiversity conservation at all three critical scales – single populations of rare species, entire community of such species and diversity at the landscape level.

ii. That Compensatory Afforestation has become the proverbial fig leaf to justify forest clearance, and that the rejection rates for ecologically destructive projects are abysmally low, at around 1%. This is notwithstanding scientific reports, which clearly conclude that no amount of Compensatory Afforestation can mitigate the impact of forest fragmentation. In the submissions cited at (3) above, it has been repeatedly requested that a paradigm shift be made from Compensatory Afforestation to a scientific landscape/ecosystem approach that is anchored on minimizing fragmentation of large blocks of contiguous forests instead of the present emphasis on only measuring area lost, enumerating trees, raising plantations and calculating NPV. This suggested policy change is being stonewalled to the detriment of the country's ecological security.

iii. That the sub-committee of the FAC has either completely failed to understand, or chosen to ignore, the impact of the forest fragmentation that will be caused by the Etalin HEP. Even though the user agency's submission, recorded in the site inspection report of the sub-committee, states that the entire project with approximately 50 components will be spread across 40 km, not one question has been raised by the FAC on the impact of fragmentation. This is a matter of grave concern.

iv. That in order to arrest and reduce forest fragmentation it has been submitted earlier that only extremely site-specific proposals of supreme national importance be considered for clearance in biodiversity hotspots and large forested landscapes, that too, only in unavoidable circumstances, and after considering all feasible alternatives. In our considered view, the Etalin HEP does not qualify in the said category. It is one amongst 50-odd hydel projects that have either been approved or under consideration as listed on the Parivesh



portal. Thus, there is nothing site-specific about the Etalin HEP nor is it of national importance. On the contrary, the incredibly rich biodiversity and ecological value of the Dibang landscape is of great national importance, which the FAC is constitutionally duty-bound to protect.

v. That a bare reading of the Site Inspection Report of the FAC sub-committee reveals that it is shockingly bereft of details of locations within the forests visited, number of grids across an altitudinal range inspected, the status of vegetation therein, direct and indirect signs of wild animals listed in the various schedules of the Wildlife Act and overall appreciation of the ecological value of the area. That the sub-committee has not intensively inspected the forest area is further evident from the fact that they appear to have merely examined tree enumeration notebooks in a meeting room and accepted the revised numbers of the State Government. There is not even a mention of any random cross-checking in the field. In the absence of facts to the contrary, this may not even qualify to be called a comprehensive "Site Visit".

vi. That the FAC sub-committee appears to have overlooked Rule 7(4)(e)(vi) of the Forest (Conservation) (Rules) 2003, (amended upto August 2017) which mandates that before making their recommendation, it must be ascertained that the State Government has considered all issues having direct and indirect impact of the diversion of forest land on forest, wildlife and environment. Even though the FAC has rightly found that the Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) of the User Agency is "inadequate", it has chosen not to recommend a full critique of the EIA. It is our considered opinion that a thorough critical review of the EIA is imperative to ferret out the possible falsification of data and misleading conclusions on the negative impacts of the project by the User agency. It is also unclear whether any action has been initiated against the User agency or the EIA consultant.

vii. That the sub-committee report records the observations on "**Wildlife aspect and WII studies**". The terms of reference framed for the WII study reads as follows – "*multiple seasonal replicate study on biodiversity assessment of the catchment area*". This notwithstanding the fact that the FAC was already aware of the attempts to cover up the real negative impacts, as is evident from the admitted inadequacy of the Impact assessment.

viii. That in view of what is stated in para vii above, the action of the FAC in framing incorrect/vague terms of reference for the WII study violates the spirit of Guideline (i) of the Lafarge Judgment wherein the Apex Court has clearly concluded that EIAs undertaken by Institutions who though accredited submit answers according to terms of reference... The WII appears to have done exactly that to enable Etalin HEP to secure clearance. It would be logical to raise a question as to whether the WII study / expenses were funded by the User Agency. If this indeed proves to be true, it would, under the specific circumstances, amount to a serious conflict of interest.

ix. That the recommendation of the sub-committee of the FAC to approve the Etalin HEP, either ignoring or glossing over evidence on the grave impact of the project on several rare, endangered and threatened (RET) species listed in Schedule I of the Wildlife Act, completely violates Rule 7(4)(e) (i) of the FC Rules 2003.

x. That para 9.1 in Chapter 9 of the FC Guidelines insists that proposals for diversion of forest lands falling within an irrigation / hydroelectric project need to be processed in their entirety to avoid creation of *fait accompli* situations. In the specific case of Etalin HEP, there appears to be no mention of the area of forest land required and the alignment of the HVDC power line, sub-station and related infrastructure for power evacuation. It has been recorded in the Fact Sheet Para 40 (vii) that "*...this will be initiated later*". This is again directly creating a *fait accompli* situation, which violates the Apex Court's Lafarge Judgment Guidelines– "*...These guidelines are required to be given so that fait accompli situations do not recur. We have issued these guidelines in the light of our experience in the last couple of years. These guidelines will operate in all future cases of environmental and forest clearances...*"



Furthermore, it is learnt from media reports and information available in the public domain, that several professional ecologists from respected scientific institutions, with expertise in a range of taxa, including research experience in the Dibang valley, have peer reviewed the Wildlife Conservation Plan of the WII and submitted it to the FAC. The review *inter alia* has established that the WII report is replete with flawed methodologies and inferences, biased sampling, lack of rigor and minimization of impacts, all of which are extremely serious defects. This scientific critique demolishes the WII report, which the sub-committee of the FAC shockingly "*appreciates*" and records that it is "*accepted in toto*".

The above submissions, when seen along with the following points –


- a. the inadequacy of the EIA, as admitted;
- b. the apparent lack of application of mind of the CCF& Nodal Officer (FCA) of Arunachal Pradesh, evident on a perusal of Form A Part IV, where he has merely stated that – "*Recommended for approval as project will be of immense importance to the state*" when he was bound to record a detailed opinion;
- c. the non-compliance of the mandated comments of the CWLW as per Form A Part II 7(x) despite recording that there are twenty-five globally threatened mammal and bird species;

establish that the entire approach and handling of this ecologically disastrous proposal by the FAC, evident on a detailed perusal of all documents including various minutes, clearly point to the fact that the proposal was never appraised and scrutinized from the perspective of rejection due to massive damage to forests and wildlife. It is indeed true that details were sought, some queries were raised but **it is very apparent that rejection of this ecologically destructive project was never considered at any stage by the FAC.** There are other discrepancies and deviations in the appraisal of the project, which we may raise at an appropriate time and forum.

The FAC, in spite of receiving compelling scientific evidence from independent ecologists that demolishes the very foundation of the WII report, the SIR and opinions of the statutory authorities who have signed on Form A – Part II, III, IV and V, is pressing ahead with what will turn out to be a pre-determined conclusion – viz. according clearance to the ecologically disastrous Etalin hydel project based on some mitigation measures. The proposed mitigation measures of setting up butterfly and reptile parks, placing nest boxes... are laughable and their acceptance is certainly not expected of an expert statutory committee like the FAC. The FAC must acknowledge that such poor mitigation, including Compensatory Afforestation, is not the panacea for such large-scale fragmentation / destruction of pristine natural forests in a biodiversity hotspot.

In view of the above facts and detailed submissions, we urge you to sincerely introspect and review the entire process. Based on overwhelming data that now forms part of the records, we seek that the FAC takes the environmentally sound and ecologically conscious decision of rejecting the Etalin HEP proposal.

## FAC members favourable to hydro project in Dibang Valley

**NEW DELHI:** The environment ministry's forest advisory committee (FAC) on Thursday discussed the issue of forest clearance for the Etalin Hydroelectric Project (3,097 MW) which will involve clearing of 2,441 hectares of what is described as "subtropical evergreen broad-leaved forest and subtropical rain forests" in the committee's own documents.

A senior member of FAC who didn't want to be named said that though a decision on granting forest clearance to the project is yet to be taken, most members have a favourable view of the project because it is a large "clean energy project" which can replace dirty energy. "We had a long discussion and all views of members have been taken on record. Most members had a favourable view, so did the sub-committee that visited the site," he added.

HT reported on April 23 that a

sub-committee of FAC which visited the site in February has recommended in its report dated April 21 that Etalin Hydroelectric Project of 3097 MW be allowed with a condition that the developer deposit money that will go towards wildlife conservation in the area.

Meanwhile, scientists who have worked in Dibang Valley wrote to the environment ministry on April 22 after they came across the FAC's sub-committee report on the Parivesh website. Umesh Sreenivasan, an associate professor at Indian Institute of Science (IISc) and Nandini Velho, wildlife biologist cited scientific studies that established that tigers are present outside the Dibang Wildlife Sanctuary in Dibang Valley and are at risk from the Etalin project.

The sub-committee report submitted on April 21 was of the view that there are no tigers in the project area. This was based on a multi-seasonal study by the Wild-

life Institute of India, which deployed 78 camera traps during a four-month survey and captured no tiger images.

Scientists have pointed out that this observation contradicts FAC's earlier observations where it referred to an independent study by a wildlife researcher that captured images of 12 individual tigers and 8 individual clouded leopards at various locations in Dibang Valley.

"A large majority, above 60%, of the camera traps were placed outside Dibang Wildlife Sanctuary which shows that both species are not only abundant but also very widespread in the district," FAC noted. The project area also falls under "vital tiger area" in the ministry's own documents.

Velho and Sreenivasan also point out in their letter that the sub-committee failed to take note of peer-reviewed studies showing Dibang Valley's outstanding rich biological diversity.

**Sub: Urgent Request to reject the FAC sub-committee recommendations on Etalin HEP proposal****Ref:** (1) Minutes of the FAC Meeting dt. 23.04.2020 through VC

(2) Agenda No. 3, F.No. 8-20/2014-FC

(3) Our submissions on the Forest Clearance process dt. 28.09.2011, 09.07.2013, and 28.09.2016.

This submission is in continuation of various representations and comments cited at (3) that some of us have submitted to the Ministry over time on strengthening the ecological basis of the forest clearance process. The signatories to this letter are active conservationists and/or former members of statutory committees, with a clear understanding of the forest clearance process, including related legal and scientific aspects of forest conservation. We also hold a pragmatic view on the need to balance conservation imperatives with development aspirations based on knowledge driven solutions. We are therefore presenting our views after due analysis, with full responsibility and in the supreme national interest.

We have very carefully studied various aspects pertaining to the Etalin HEP and are deeply concerned about the recommendations of the sub-committee of the FAC recorded in the minutes cited at (1) above, that – *"The project may be allowed subject to the condition that the financial outlay of Wildlife Conservation Plan be deposited to Forest Department by User Agency"* on the basis of a Wildlife Study done by WII which – *"...is accepted in toto..."*

Based on our analysis of published data and peer reviewed scientific principles of landscape ecology, we submit that the sub-committee of the FAC appears to be ignoring established tenets of forest conservation



and related legal issues while recommending this proposal, which is highly destructive, and the impacts of which **cannot be “mitigated”**. This may be tantamount to a breach of the FAC’s constitutional and statutory duty to conserve forests.

Fundamentally, the objects of the Forest (Conservation) Act, 1980, (69 of 1980), which was enacted in furtherance of the Constitutional obligations of the Central Government under Article 48-A, is to ensure protection of forests and wildlife, and not just clearance of projects by imposing standard conditions and compensatory afforestation. The Supreme Court, in 2003 AIR (SC) 3240 (3 judges), has held that – *“We cannot shut our eyes to the statements made in Article 48-A of the Constitution of India which enjoins upon the State to protect and improve the environment and to safeguard the forests and wild life of the country. What is destructive of environment, forest and wild life, thus, being contrary to the Directive Principles of the State Policy which is fundamental in the governance of the country must be given its full effect”*...

This interpretation has been reiterated in a catena of Judgments by the Apex Court, which you are all well aware of. Thus, as members of the FAC, you are under a legal obligation to conserve forests and wildlife. The FAC, being a statutory committee, has a duty to conserve forests, and not merely to mechanically grant permissions, even to such destructive proposals, under the pretext of development. By glossing over crucial facts, and by accepting untenable submissions in reports submitted by WII, the User agency and State forest officers, the FAC is doing a grave disservice to the larger interests of the nation, i.e., its ecological security.

In order to substantiate the submissions made above, we present the following facts and data for your kind consideration –

i. That the FAC continues to ignore the biggest threat to forests -**Forest fragmentation**—resulting from ill-planned intrusion of developmental projects into contiguous landscapes with natural forests. Peer reviewed research has clearly established that the effects of fragmentation are highly deleterious to biodiversity conservation at all three critical scales – single populations of rare species, entire community of such species and diversity at the landscape level.

ii. That Compensatory Afforestation has become the proverbial fig leaf to justify forest clearance, and that the rejection rates for ecologically destructive projects are abysmally low, at around 1%. This is notwithstanding scientific reports, which clearly conclude that no amount of Compensatory Afforestation can mitigate the impact of forest fragmentation. In the submissions cited at (3) above, it has been repeatedly requested that a paradigm shift be made from Compensatory Afforestation to a scientific landscape/ecosystem approach that is anchored on minimizing fragmentation of large blocks of contiguous forests instead of the present emphasis on only measuring area lost, enumerating trees, raising plantations and calculating NPV. This suggested policy change is being stonewalled to the detriment of the country’s ecological security.

iii. That the sub-committee of the FAC has either completely failed to understand, or chosen to ignore, the impact of the forest fragmentation that will be caused by the Etalin HEP. Even though the user agency’s submission, recorded in the site inspection report of the sub-committee, states that the entire project with approximately 50 components will be spread across 40 km, not one question has been raised by the FAC on the impact of fragmentation. This is a matter of grave concern.

iv. That in order to arrest and reduce forest fragmentation it has been submitted earlier that only extremely site-specific proposals of supreme national importance be considered for clearance in biodiversity hotspots and large forested landscapes, that too, only in unavoidable circumstances, and after considering all feasible alternatives. In our considered view, the Etalin HEP does not qualify in the said category. It is one amongst 50-odd hydel projects that have either been approved or under consideration as listed on the Parivesh



portal. Thus, there is nothing site-specific about the Etalin HEP nor is it of national importance. On the contrary, the incredibly rich biodiversity and ecological value of the Dibang landscape is of great national importance, which the FAC is constitutionally duty-bound to protect.

v. That a bare reading of the Site Inspection Report of the FAC sub-committee reveals that it is shockingly bereft of details of locations within the forests visited, number of grids across an altitudinal range inspected, the status of vegetation therein, direct and indirect signs of wild animals listed in the various schedules of the Wildlife Act and overall appreciation of the ecological value of the area. That the sub-committee has not intensively inspected the forest area is further evident from the fact that they appear to have merely examined tree enumeration notebooks in a meeting room and accepted the revised numbers of the State Government. There is not even a mention of any random cross-checking in the field. In the absence of facts to the contrary, this may not even qualify to be called a comprehensive "Site Visit".

vi. That the FAC sub-committee appears to have overlooked Rule 7(4)(e)(vi) of the Forest (Conservation) (Rules) 2003, (amended upto August 2017) which mandates that before making their recommendation, it must be ascertained that the State Government has considered all issues having direct and indirect impact of the diversion of forest land on forest, wildlife and environment. Even though the FAC has rightly found that the Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) of the User Agency is "inadequate", it has chosen not to recommend a full critique of the EIA. It is our considered opinion that a thorough critical review of the EIA is imperative to ferret out the possible falsification of data and misleading conclusions on the negative impacts of the project by the User agency. It is also unclear whether any action has been initiated against the User agency or the EIA consultant.

vii. That the sub-committee report records the observations on "**Wildlife aspect and WII studies**". The terms of reference framed for the WII study reads as follows – "*multiple seasonal replicate study on biodiversity assessment of the catchment area*". This notwithstanding the fact that the FAC was already aware of the attempts to cover up the real negative impacts, as is evident from the admitted inadequacy of the Impact assessment.

viii. That in view of what is stated in para vii above, the action of the FAC in framing incorrect/vague terms of reference for the WII study violates the spirit of Guideline (i) of the Lafarge Judgment wherein the Apex Court has clearly concluded that EIAs undertaken by Institutions who though accredited submit answers according to terms of reference... The WII appears to have done exactly that to enable Etalin HEP to secure clearance. It would be logical to raise a question as to whether the WII study / expenses were funded by the User Agency. If this indeed proves to be true, it would, under the specific circumstances, amount to a serious conflict of interest.

ix. That the recommendation of the sub-committee of the FAC to approve the Etalin HEP, either ignoring or glossing over evidence on the grave impact of the project on several rare, endangered and threatened (RET) species listed in Schedule I of the Wildlife Act, completely violates Rule 7(4)(e) (i) of the FC Rules 2003.

x. That para 9.1 in Chapter 9 of the FC Guidelines insists that proposals for diversion of forest lands falling within an irrigation / hydroelectric project need to be processed in their entirety to avoid creation of *fait accompli* situations. In the specific case of Etalin HEP, there appears to be no mention of the area of forest land required and the alignment of the HVDC power line, sub-station and related infrastructure for power evacuation. It has been recorded in the Fact Sheet Para 40 (vii) that "*...this will be initiated later*". This is again directly creating a *fait accompli* situation, which violates the Apex Court's Lafarge Judgment Guidelines– "*...These guidelines are required to be given so that fait accompli situations do not recur. We have issued these guidelines in the light of our experience in the last couple of years. These guidelines will operate in all future cases of environmental and forest clearances...*"

Furthermore, it is learnt from media reports and information available in the public domain, that several professional ecologists from respected scientific institutions, with expertise in a range of taxa, including research experience in the Dibang valley, have peer reviewed the Wildlife Conservation Plan of the WII and submitted it to the FAC. The review *inter alia* has established that the WII report is replete with flawed methodologies and inferences, biased sampling, lack of rigor and minimization of impacts, all of which are extremely serious defects. This scientific critique demolishes the WII report, which the sub-committee of the FAC shockingly "*appreciates*" and records that it is "*accepted in toto*".

The above submissions, when seen along with the following points –


- a. the inadequacy of the EIA, as admitted;
- b. the apparent lack of application of mind of the CCF& Nodal Officer (FCA) of Arunachal Pradesh, evident on a perusal of Form A Part IV, where he has merely stated that – "*Recommended for approval as project will be of immense importance to the state*" when he was bound to record a detailed opinion;
- c. the non-compliance of the mandated comments of the CWLW as per Form A Part II 7(x) despite recording that there are twenty-five globally threatened mammal and bird species;

establish that the entire approach and handling of this ecologically disastrous proposal by the FAC, evident on a detailed perusal of all documents including various minutes, clearly point to the fact that the proposal was never appraised and scrutinized from the perspective of rejection due to massive damage to forests and wildlife. It is indeed true that details were sought, some queries were raised but **it is very apparent that rejection of this ecologically destructive project was never considered at any stage by the FAC.** There are other discrepancies and deviations in the appraisal of the project, which we may raise at an appropriate time and forum.

The FAC, in spite of receiving compelling scientific evidence from independent ecologists that demolishes the very foundation of the WII report, the SIR and opinions of the statutory authorities who have signed on Form A – Part II, III, IV and V, is pressing ahead with what will turn out to be a pre-determined conclusion – viz. according clearance to the ecologically disastrous Etalin hydel project based on some mitigation measures. The proposed mitigation measures of setting up butterfly and reptile parks, placing nest boxes... are laughable and their acceptance is certainly not expected of an expert statutory committee like the FAC. The FAC must acknowledge that such poor mitigation, including Compensatory Afforestation, is not the panacea for such large-scale fragmentation / destruction of pristine natural forests in a biodiversity hotspot.

In view of the above facts and detailed submissions, we urge you to sincerely introspect and review the entire process. Based on overwhelming data that now forms part of the records, we seek that the FAC takes the environmentally sound and ecologically conscious decision of rejecting the Etalin HEP proposal.

Esteemed Members of the Forest Advisory Committee,

We write to you again for your kind consideration in the light of the Forest Advisory Committee meeting held on the 23rd of April, 2020. A report on the matter in the Hindustan Times (filed on the same day) states that the Forest Advisory Committee held a favourable view on passing the proposed Etalin Hydro-Electric Project (3097 MW).

We would like to respectfully submit the following points for the kind consideration of the FAC and we hope that the esteemed committee will consider these issues before arriving at a final conclusion:

**1. UNDERVALUING THE COMMUNITY-FORESTS OF DIBANG VALLEY**

One of the interpretations regarding community-managed forests (Unclassed State Forests) outside Dibang Wildlife Sanctuary is that they are 'degraded', and therefore of limited value for conservation. However, an independent camera-trap based study cited by your committee (F. No. 8-20/2014-FC) found that these community-managed forests hosted a much higher diversity of mammals than Dibang WLS. Further, using a large sample of camera-trap data, this study also estimated that the landscape of Dibang Valley could harbour as many as 52 (22-144) adult tigers, a large majority of which are likely to hold permanent home ranges in the district's community forests. Further, and as we have highlighted in our previous submission to the esteemed FAC members, these studies have also found eight different individual tigers and eight individual clouded leopards in these community-managed forests.

Further, the Factsheet (24.vi in F. No. 8-20/2014-FC) considered in the deliberations of the FAC meeting dated 28th February 2017 states that "The land in which the project is proposed is in pristine forests with riverine growth that once cut cannot be replaced". This assessment of irreplaceability is also corroborated by the Site Inspection Report of the Regional Office, Shillong (dated the 3rd and 4th of December, 2014) within which they state that "The forest area in which the project was proposed is in luxuriant USF [Unclassified State Forests]". The report further states that "In one of the sampling plots, two trees of *Toona ciliata* of >800 cms gbh were seen". As per the Factsheet considered in the deliberation of the FAC, forests with trees of eight metre in girth are irreplaceable; in this light, we request your kind reconsideration regarding the irreplaceability of these forests that may be lost permanently.

**2. UNIQUENESS OF BIODIVERSITY OF THE AREA**

Multiple sources of evidence point to the outstanding richness of biodiversity of the area, much of which is yet to be thoroughly studied. The biodiversity assessment surveys by the Wildlife Institute of India (WII) that were conducted between the altitudes of 600 to 1800 found 21 mammal species and 230 bird species from the Etalin-Hydro Electric Project study area. Further, a rapid assessment survey in a comparable elevational range (conducted between 28th August, 2015 and 4th September, 2015) near Etalin recorded 24 mammal species over 100 species of birds in just 8 days (Athreya and Sheth, 2016). Further, the basin of the Dibang River has a high degree of endemism. Of the 16 range-restricted species in the Eastern Himalayas, six were found in the study area. WII's report clarifies that, "Four of these habitat specialists were present along the Dri river while all six species [were found] along [the] Tangon river" (WII 2019: 106).

**3. UNDERESTIMATION OF BIODIVERSITY VALUE OF THE AREA**

Athreya and Sheth (2016) note that the 24 mammal and 100 bird species that they recorded in a mere eight days are likely to be a serious underestimate. They add that the “actual bird list within a 10 km radius of [the] Etalin-Damro road is more likely to be closer to 300 species including some rare ones like Blyth's Tragopan, Rufous-necked Hornbill, Ward's Trogon, Hodgson's Frogmouth, Beautiful Nuthatch, Wedge-billed Babbler, Mishmi-Wren-babbler, etc”. To put this in context, the entire country of Norway, 42 times the size of Dibang Valley district, hosts around 282 resident bird species. Both Athreya and Sheth's observations and our own work from a similar elevational gradient to the proposed dam site (400-1500 m. ASL) in Arunachal Pradesh confirm the occurrence of extremely high biodiversity richness in this elevational band. Finally, many researchers have noted that a majority of biodiversity documentation has focused in the western parts of Arunachal Pradesh, with vast areas of Dibang Valley still scientifically understudied, with potential for the discovery of new species. From our long-term onground engagement with residents, We would further like to note that in parts of Arunachal Pradesh, including in the Mishmi Hills, wildlife- and bird-based tourism currently does—and has the great potential to be—a sustainable source of income for communities that manage these forest lands.

In its meeting on 28th February, 2017, the FAC recommended that an internationally credible agency be appointed to conduct multiple seasonal replicate studies on biodiversity assessment as “the current study (EIA) is completely inadequate in this regard”. Following up on this suggestion by the FAC, a four-month single-season study was conducted by WII; a multi-season study, as required by the FAC, is certain to have recorded much greater biodiversity than this single season study. Indeed, the WII report itself states that, “the study was a rapid assessment and only for four months covering only parts of different seasons” and that “...this could not be the true scenario as the study was only for four months and did not cover all season fully (pp. 102)”. The report adds that the study did not contain an adequate assessment of the importance of the project area for wildlife, particularly for migratory species (pp. 102-103). Furthermore, in a three-year camera trapping study conducted by WII, nine adult tigers were camera-trapped in the Dibang Valley. Over a separate four-month survey of 1,552 trap nights, WII's report concurs that “tiger presence and movement in the project area cannot be completely ruled out based on this few months' survey, as they are long-ranging species.” We respectfully submit that making a decision based on an incomplete assessment of the extent of impacts on the area's unique biodiversity, including tigers, would run counter to the FAC's original recommendation for a full multi-season study.

#### 4. CUMULATIVE IMPACTS OF HYDRO-POWER PROJECTS

In our earlier submission (dated 23rd April 2020), we suggested that there must be a cumulative assessment of the biodiversity impacts of multiple hydro-power projects planned in the Dibang Basin. Most notable of these are India's two biggest projects – the 3097 MW Etalin and 2880 MW Dibang Multipurpose project. We respectfully submit that the impacts of multiple projects placed in close proximity on the same river limb must be assessed together, because these impacts will be cumulative and not independent. This applies in particular to the breaking up of 3097 MW Etalin project and 22 MW Anonpani project as separate diversion proposals. The FAC, in its letter dated 28th February 2017 contended that “two different proposals for diversion of forest land in favour of same user agency...shall be combined and one comprehensive proposal with total land requirement shall be placed before FAC for further consideration”. The smaller Anonpani project is being built by the same developer mainly solely to provide construction power for the 3097 MW Etalin project. Therefore, the forest land required for the Anonpani project is an integral part of the Etalin project, necessitating that their impacts be assessed jointly. Additionally, we submit that the biodiversity impacts of another proposed project located only a few kilometres upstream from these two projects on the same river (Tangon/Talon limb), the 680 MW Athunli Hydropower Project, must also be considered jointly.

#### 5. COMPENSATORY AFFORESTATION AND THE FOREST (RIGHTS) ACT

In the Factsheet considered in the deliberations of the FAC, the 25 patches identified for Compensatory Afforestation of 1841.32 hectares in Dibang Valley (pt. no. 47) have only been assessed through satellite imagery (from Google Earth), with no indication of whether Gram Sabha consent has been obtained. If this were indeed the case, this would result in non-compliance of the Forest (Rights) Act of 2005, given that forest diversion under the Forest (Conservation) Act, of 1980 requires Gram Sabha consent for “compensatory and ameliorative measures” (MoEF F. No. 11-9/1998-FC, 3rd August, 2009).

#### 6. ADHERING TO INTERNATIONAL COMMITMENTS

India is a signatory to several key international commitments for the protection of biodiversity. Most notable amongst these are the Convention of Biological Diversity (CBD) and Convention on the Conservation of Migratory Species of Animals (CMS) that are relevant to the protection of species found in Dibang Valley. WII's report (WII 2019:102) states that, “it is evident that the study area and both the rivers provide habitat, also for bird species that visit in different seasons, either for nesting (summer season visitors) or feeding (winter visitors).” Dibang Reserve Forest and its adjacent areas, along with Dibang Wildlife Sanctuary are officially recognised as globally Important Bird Areas (IBAs) harbouring globally threatened range-restricted species. The destruction of the habitat of the many species of migratory birds that utilize the project area is likely to undermine India's commitment to CMS.

Importantly, India is not only a signatory to the Global Tiger Initiative (GTI), but also its founding member. Peer-reviewed research by the WII scientists, published in Global Ecology and Conservation, concludes that the entire area of Dibang Valley has a genetically distinct population of tigers that “merit the status of a special population unit of high conservation value.” India's commitments to the Global Tiger Initiative mean recognising that “undervalued tiger ecosystems are degrading and disappearing”, and that “...tiger landscapes are significantly undervalued in national and global agendas” (pp ix).

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As wildlife scientists and conservationists working in Arunachal Pradesh, and not least as citizens of India, we respectfully request that the FAC kindly deliberate upon the above concerns prior to making their final decision. We would especially urge you to kindly consider the global uniqueness and value of this land, as well as India's international commitments to the protection of globally important forests and biodiversity. Indeed, scientists from WII have stated that the "Mishmi Hill ranges are now documented to have more tigers than other designated tiger reserves in Arunachal Pradesh".

Across government and non-government institutions, there is unequivocal evidence of the local, regional, national and global uniqueness of Dibang Valley. We are at the juncture where it is possible to put forth an exemplary partnership-based Idu Mishmi model of wildlife conservation, not only for Arunachal Pradesh but as an example for the entire country and the world to follow. We implore you to choose this option. India can once again lead the world as a true ecological champion in this time of unprecedented social and ecological crisis.

Please for a change, let's put the entire planet before our own selfish needs as the planet has a way to give to every individual if we give her a chance.

Here is Ms. Roshni Ali's petition and I hope your emails are being bombarded with requests to STOP THE HYDROPOWER PROJECT:

According to Hindustan Times, a FAC sub-committee report on 21st April 2020, recommended the 3,097 MW Etalin Hydroelectric Project be allowed with a condition that the developer deposits money for wildlife conservation in the area. The project will **involve submerging of 1150.08 ha of forest land and felling of 2.7 lakh trees** in what FAC's documents call "**subtropical evergreen broad-leaved and subtropical rainforest**".

The project is being executed through the Etalin Hydro Electric Power Company Limited, a JV company of Jindal Power Limited and Hydro Power Development Corporation of Arunachal Pradesh Limited (A Govt of Arunachal Pradesh Undertaking).

The dam is going to have disastrous effects on the environment and people. Here is a quick look at some of the negative impacts of the dam:

1. **Loss of trees:** Trees give off oxygen that we need to breathe. **Forests are lungs of the planet.** Trees reduce the amount of stormwater runoff, which reduces erosion and pollution in our waterways. The common flora like Alnus Nepalensis, Tsuga, Rhododendron, Oak, Cryptomeria japonica, Pine, Chestnut, Walnut, and some of the Medicinal Plants are popularly found in the region. The area is a treasure trove for scientific research.

2. **Loss of Wildlife:** Cutting 2.7 lakh trees will make millions of **species homeless**. A 2016 study, titled, 'Mitigation of Damage to Wildlife Habitats', by the Pune-based Indian Institute of Science Education & Research (IISER), "bird list within a 10 km radius of Etalin-Damro road is close to 300 species, including some rare ones like Blyth's Tragopan, Rufous-necked Hornbill, Ward's Trogon, Hodgson's Frogmouth, Beautiful Nuthatch, etc."

The Dibang valley is the natural habitat of several wild animals, specifically larger herbivores, carnivores and amphibians. The animals range from Red Panda, Musk Deer, Snow Leopard, Tiger, Orange Bellied Himalayan Squirrel, Wild Boar, Himalayan black bear, Barking Deer, Snow Leopard, Sun Bear and the famous Mishmi Takin, and many more beautiful animals find a habitat in the forest of Dibang Valley. **According to The Times of India, Arunachal's Dibang could be India's highest tiger habitat.**

3. **The spread of Unknown Zoonotic Diseases:** Also, the trees are homes to millions of bats, and bats are known to be carriers of numerous diseases. As we just learnt from the Coronavirus outbreak, that when wildlife and humans intermingle there could be a rise of diseases.

4. **Loss of fishes habitats affecting local communities:**

The dam will be holding back millions of gallons of water to follow downstream. The fish population will immediately get affected, due to a sudden change in their natural spawning cycle. Populations of migratory species may collapse or even disappear. On average, freshwater **fish populations have declined by 76% over the past 40 years.**

One of the reasons being the water held in the dam will **cause a change in oxygen and temperature which will cause many species to dies out.** The loss of fishes will threaten the livelihood of local communities. These local communities will not have a free-flowing river and will find dry river beds most of the time.

5. **A loss for Farmers:** The dam will trap sediments which are critical for maintaining bio-physical processes and habitats downstream This will have an adverse effect on the farmers downstream as the sediment-rich soil helps them grow crops. Due to the dam, the land will become less fertile, thus making the farmers turn to chemical fertilizer to make up for the depleted soil, again adding to pollutants in the river.

6. **Adding to Climate Change :**

Climate Crisis is now a major global issue. Trees help regulate temperature and bring rain. **In Dibang valley districts, there has been a decreasing trend of rainfall.**

Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC, 2007), says the future climate change is likely to **affect agriculture, increase the risk of hunger and water scarcity**, and lead to more rapid melting of glaciers. **Freshwater availability in many river basins in India is likely to decrease due to climate change.** By adding the dam we will be contributing to climate change causing scarcity of water leading to food shortage. The **local communities** will be the first to see it's effect as they will battle drought and water shortage.

7. **In-efficient Power:** According to the South Asia Network on Dams, Rivers and People (SANDRP) Hydroelectricity is not an efficient energy source. **89% of hydropower projects across the country generate below what they promised; of which half generate below 50% of the electricity they promised.** Solar energy should be encouraged by grassroots entrepreneurs. Local generation and local distribution is the best way forward.

8. **Earthquake Prone Region:** The seismological threat is real. The Himalayas is on major fault lines. **Massive industrial drilling can cause severe landslides** endangering local communities and animals. In October 2017 and July 2019 an Earthquake of magnitude 4.5 hit Arunachal's Dibang Valley. These tremors could get even worse with industrial drilling and use of dynamite leading to enormous landslides.

9. **Potential Mis-Management:** In June 2013, floods severely damaged parts of Uttarakhand. About 6,000 people died, and tens of thousands of pilgrims were stranded. When dam reservoirs upstream brimmed over the danger mark, dam operators opened the sluice gates without warning villagers living downstream. The unexpected deluge washed away people, livestock, and buildings. There has been no accountability for this disaster. The Dibang Valley dam could cause havoc to the simple communities living downstream.

10. **The future is Clean Ethical Energy:** With the rise of global consciousness, this is the time for a major shift. We often say, like to follow the path of the 'developed' nations. For your information, from 1912 to 2018, **1,578 dams have been removed in the U.S. to restore fish passage and access to habitat, eliminate safety hazards, and reduce future liability for owners and surrounding communities.** Hydro-Power is the PAST.

**CONCLUSION**

For a community at large, **Hydro-Power is not a profitable venture.** It's a huge loss for people, animals and the environment.

We need a better world!

**We need a world where we live in harmony with nature.**

I feel it's time we stand up against big corporates and corrupt politicians and protect the magnificent earth we are privileged too.

These local communities will not have a free-flowing river and will find dry river beds most of the time.

5. **A loss for Farmers:** The dam will trap sediments which are critical for maintaining bio-physical processes and habitats downstream This will have an adverse effect on the farmers downstream as the sediment-rich soil helps them grow crops. Due to the dam, the land will become less fertile, thus making the farmers turn to chemical fertilizer to make up for the depleted soil, again adding to pollutants in the river.

6. **Adding to Climate Change :**

Climate Crisis is now a major global issue. Trees help regulate temperature and bring rain. **In Dibang valley districts, there has been a decreasing trend of rainfall.**
