

Hon'ble Prime Minister is also the Chairman of the National Board for Wild Life.</p> <p>The important points which would assist in management and conservation of protected areas are as follows:</p> <p>a. Strength to campaign of solid waste management and freedom from single use plastic - the Panchayats, local bodies, self-help groups and MSMEs may be encouraged on the issue:</p> <p>Solid waste management (SWM) is a major problem, where urbanization, industrialization and economic growth have resulted in increased municipal solid waste (MSW) generation per person. Effective SWM is a major challenge in cities with high population density. Achieving sustainable development within a country experiencing rapid population growth and improvements in living standards is a challenge in India because of its diversity with many different religious groups, cultures and traditions and growing pressure on the protected areas abutting human habitations and in Eco-sensitive Zones.</p> <p>b. To conserve the water conservation as water is very important for human life. In this regard, to develop 75 Amrit Sarovar (ponds) [Wetlands] in every district during the 'Amrit Mahotsav' of Independence:</p> <p>Wetlands are a critical part of our natural environment. Wetlands in the protected areas and forests and eco-sensitive zones are crucial for wild animals and forests. They provide habitat for animals and plants and many contain a wide diversity of life, supporting plants and animals that are found nowhere else. Their conservation is important for the recharge of ground water and overall survival of living beings. Wetlands protect our shores from wave action, reduce the impacts of floods, absorb pollutants and improve water quality.</p>
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		<p>1. There is a theme on Experienced Based Learning and great emphasis has been laid on it. The Ministry may take up the issue of the Experienced Based Learning with the Department of Education;</p> <p>As the name suggests, experiential learning is the process of learning through experience. Experiential learning as "the process whereby knowledge is created through the transformation of experience. Knowledge results from the combinations of grasping and transforming the experience." This is important from the conservation perspective which can be promoted among the school and college students, local communities and all stakeholders of forests and wildlife. This could be a tool for creating awareness regarding conservation and protection of forests and wildlife.</p> <p>d. Carbon sequestration - Construction of tunnels, flyovers helps in reducing carbon emission and this angle should be considered while issuing clearances:</p> <p>Carbon sequestration is the process of capturing and storing atmospheric carbon dioxide. It is one method of reducing the amount of carbon dioxide in the atmosphere with the goal of reducing global climate change. Linear infrastructure projects such as roads, railways etc. should be aimed at reducing carbon footprints. The implementing agencies while formulating the projects pay special attention towards their responsibility in mitigating climate change whenever the projects are designed and in particular when the such projects are proposed to be located within protected areas, tiger reserves, forests, wildlife corridors and eco-sensitive zones.</p> <p>It is suggested as follows:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> The Ministry may either issue advisory to the Chief Wild Life Wardens for implementation of the above matters in the States/UT; or The certain conditions may be imposed on the User Agencies at the time of recommendations of project proposals to adhere to these mantras while executing the recommended projects. <p>The Standing Committee may like to deliberate and provide guidance to the Ministry.</p>

(b) In the event, however, the ESZ is already prescribed as per law that goes beyond one kilometre buffer zone, the wider margin as ESZ shall prevail. If such wider buffer zone beyond one kilometre is proposed under any statutory instrument for a particular national park or wildlife sanctuary awaiting final decision in that regard, then till such final decision is taken, the ESZ covering the area beyond one kilometre as proposed shall be maintained....

(e) In the event any activity is already being undertaken within the one kilometre or extended buffer zone (ESZ), as the case may be, of any wildlife sanctuary or national park which does not come within the ambit of prohibited activities as per the 9th February 2011 Guidelines, such activities may continue with permission of the Principal Chief Conservator of Forests of each State or Union Territory and the person responsible for such activities in such a situation shall obtain necessary permission within a period of six months. Such permission shall be given once the Principal Chief Conservator of Forests is satisfied that the activities concerned do not come within the prohibited list and were continuing prior to passing of this order in a legitimate manner. No new permanent structure shall be permitted to come up for whatsoever purpose within the ESZ.

(h) In respect of sanctuaries or national parks for which the proposal of a State or Union Territory has not been given, the 10 kilometres buffer zone as ESZ, as indicated in the order passed by this Court on 4th December 2006 in the case of Goa Foundation and also contained in the Guidelines of 9th February 2011 shall be implemented.
