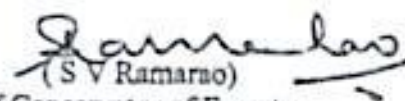

Minutes of the 16th Meeting of the State Board for Wildlife (SBWL)
dated 4th December, 2020

The 16th Meeting of the State Board for Wildlife (SBWL) was held on Friday the 4th December, 2020 under the Chairmanship of Shri. Uddhav Balasaheb Thackeray, Hon'ble Chief Minister, Maharashtra State through Video Conference at 1600 hrs. The list of the members who attended the meeting is attached herewith as Annexure-I.

The Principal Chief Conservator of Forest (Wildlife) and Member Secretary, State Board for Wildlife welcomed Hon'ble Chairman & the Chief Minister, Maharashtra State and Hon'ble Vice-Chairman & Minister (Forests), Hon'ble Minister (Environment, Tourism and Protocol) and other members of the SBWL and presented issues listed in the Agenda for discussions with the permission of the Chairman. The details of the discussions and decisions taken by the board are as follows.

Agenda No. 1: Confirmation of the minutes of the 15th meeting of the State Board for Wildlife held on 07th August, 2020

The member secretary of the board briefed that the Minutes (English and Marathi) of the 15th Meeting of the State Board for Wildlife (SBWL) held on 7th August 2020 had been circulated to the members vide letter dated 14/09/2020. Some members suggested changes in the Minutes of Meeting (MoM) of 15th meeting of SBWL and these changes had been submitted to Government. Principal Secretary (Forests) conveyed that the changes would be considered and decision taken thereon would be circulated along with the minutes of this meeting. Members informed that the Minutes of the 14th Meeting have not been confirmed so far and in this meeting it was erroneously mentioned that the board has recommended the proposal of cement roads in the core area of Melghat Tiger Reserve and due to this National Board for Wildlife (NBWL) also recommended the proposal. However, this proposal is now under consideration of Central Empowered Committee (CEC). In response to this, member secretary clarified that while recommending the cement roads in question, NBWL had imposed certain conditions on the project authority, these conditions take care of the concerns raised by the members and since the proposal is now under consideration of CEC, the work on any of the roads in question has not been started. The members shall be communicated accordingly.

Agenda No. 2 : Action Taken Report on the minutes of the 15th Meeting of the State Board for Wildlife held on 7th August 2020.

The member secretary informed the board about the subject wise Action Taken Report on the decisions of the 15th meeting of SBWL has been submitted and included in agenda notes. Important items of Action Taken Report were discussed.

2 (A)	Declaring Kanhargaon Wildlife Sanctuary in Chandrapur district	The member secretary briefed the board that, as decided in 15th meeting of SBWL, a committee was constituted under the Chairmanship of Additional Principal Chief Conservator of Forests (Wildlife), East, Nagpur to discuss with the local people and satisfy their queries and convince them about misapprehensions about the Wildlife Sanctuary. This committee held meeting with the local people and had discussions with them. The committee recommended that though there are reservations of some local people to declare the area as Sanctuary, it is necessary to declare this area as a Sanctuary taking into account the importance of the area for dispersal of tigers. The Chief Wildlife Warden agrees with the recommendations of the committee. This was discussed in the board and it was opined that it is essential to declare Kanhargaon Sanctuary.	Hon'ble Chairman and Chief Minister approved the declaration of Kanhargaon as the 50th Wildlife Sanctuary of Maharashtra. All the members of the board welcomed this decision.

The proposal of inclusion of 5 villages from buffer of Bor Sanctuary has already been submitted to Government by Principal Chief Conservator of Forests, Wildlife vide letter dt. 08/05/2020. However, similar demand can come from the remaining 52 villages in the buffer and that would require huge funds. Therefore, it is necessary to get funds from Tribal Sub-Plan of Tribal Development Department for rehabilitation of willing tribal-dominated villages in the sanctuaries and adjacent to the boundary of the sanctuaries. Minutes of the 16th Meeting of the State Board for Wildlife (SBWL)
dated 4th December, 2020

The 16th Meeting of the State Board for Wildlife (SBWL) was held on Friday the 4th December, 2020 under the Chairmanship of Shri. Uddhav Balasaheb Thackeray, Hon'ble Chief Minister, Maharashtra State through Video Conference at 1600 hrs. The list of the members who attended the meeting is attached herewith as Annexure-I.

The Principal Chief Conservator of Forest (Wildlife) and Member Secretary, State Board for Wildlife welcomed Hon'ble Chairman & the Chief Minister, Maharashtra State and Hon'ble Vice-Chairman & Minister (Forests), Hon'ble Minister (Environment, Tourism and Protocol) and other members of the SBWL and presented issues listed in the Agenda for discussions with the permission of the Chairman. The details of the discussions and decisions taken by the board are as follows.

Agenda No. 1: Confirmation of the minutes of the 15th meeting of the State Board for Wildlife held on 07th August, 2020

The member secretary of the board briefed that the Minutes (English and Marathi) of the 15th Meeting of the State Board for Wildlife (SBWL) held on 7th August 2020 had been circulated to the members vide letter dated 14/09/2020. Some members suggested changes in the Minutes of Meeting (MoM) of 15th meeting of SBWL and these changes had been submitted to Government. Principal Secretary (Forests) conveyed that the changes would be considered and decision taken thereon would be circulated along with the minutes of this meeting. Members informed that the Minutes of the 14th Meeting have not been confirmed so far and in this meeting it was erroneously mentioned that the board has recommended the proposal of cement roads in the core area of Melghat Tiger Reserve and due to this National Board for Wildlife (NBWL) also recommended the proposal. However, this proposal is now under consideration of Central Empowered Committee (CEC). In response to this, member secretary clarified that while recommending the cement roads in question, NBWL had imposed certain conditions on the project authority, these conditions take care of the concerns raised by the members and since the proposal is now under consideration of CEC, the work on any of the roads in question has not been started. The members shall be communicated accordingly.

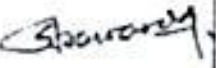

Minutes of the 16th Meeting of the State Board for Wildlife (SBWL)
dated 4th December, 2020

The 16th Meeting of the State Board for Wildlife (SBWL) was held on Friday the 4th December, 2020 under the Chairmanship of Shri. Uddhav Balasaheb Thackeray, Hon'ble Chief Minister, Maharashtra State through Video Conference at 1600 hrs. The list of the members who attended the meeting is attached herewith as Annexure-I.

The Principal Chief Conservator of Forest (Wildlife) and Member Secretary, State Board for Wildlife welcomed Hon'ble Chairman & the Chief Minister, Maharashtra State and Hon'ble Vice-Chairman & Minister (Forests), Hon'ble Minister (Environment, Tourism and Protocol) and other members of the SBWL and presented issues listed in the Agenda for discussions with the permission of the Chairman. The details of the discussions and decisions taken by the board are as follows.

Agenda No. 1: Confirmation of the minutes of the 15th meeting of the State Board for Wildlife held on 07th August, 2020

The member secretary of the board briefed that the Minutes (English and Marathi) of the 15th Meeting of the State Board for Wildlife (SBWL) held on 7th August 2020 had been circulated to the members vide letter dated 14/09/2020. Some members suggested changes in the Minutes of Meeting (MoM) of 15th meeting of SBWL and these changes had been submitted to Government. Principal Secretary (Forests) conveyed that the changes would be considered and decision taken thereon would be circulated along with the minutes of this meeting. Members informed that the Minutes of the 14th Meeting have not been confirmed so far and in this meeting it was erroneously mentioned that the board has recommended the proposal of cement roads in the core area of Melghat Tiger Reserve and due to this National Board for Wildlife (NBWL) also recommended the proposal. However, this proposal is now under consideration of Central Empowered Committee (CEC). In response to this, member secretary clarified that while recommending the cement roads in question, NBWL had imposed certain conditions on the project authority, these conditions take care of the concerns raised by the members and since the proposal is now under consideration of CEC, the work on any of the roads in question has not been started. The members shall be communicated accordingly.

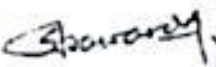
Agenda No. 2 : Action Taken Report on the minutes of the 15th Meeting of the State Board for Wildlife held on 7th August 2020.

The member secretary informed the board about the subject wise Action Taken Report on the decisions of the 15th meeting of SBWL has been submitted and included in agenda notes. Important items of Action Taken Report were discussed.

This committee held meeting with the local people and had discussions with them. The committee recommended that though there are reservations of some local people to declare the area as Sanctuary, it is necessary to declare this area as a Sanctuary taking into account the importance of the area for dispersal of tigers. The Chief Wildlife Warden agrees with the recommendations of the committee. This was discussed in the board and it was opined that it is essential to declare Kanhargaoon Sanctuary.	Hon'ble Chairman and Chief Minister approved the declaration of Kanhargaoon as the 50 th Wildlife Sanctuary of Maharashtra. All the members of the board welcomed this decision.

Therefore, it is necessary to get funds from Tribal Sub-Plan of Tribal Development Department for rehabilitation of willing tribal-dominated villages in the sanctuaries and adjacent to the boundary of the sanctuaries. A proposal for making available these funds had been submitted to Government vide letter dt. 12/11/2020 and both the proposals are under consideration of the Government. 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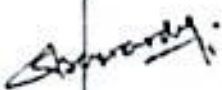

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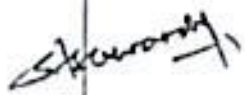

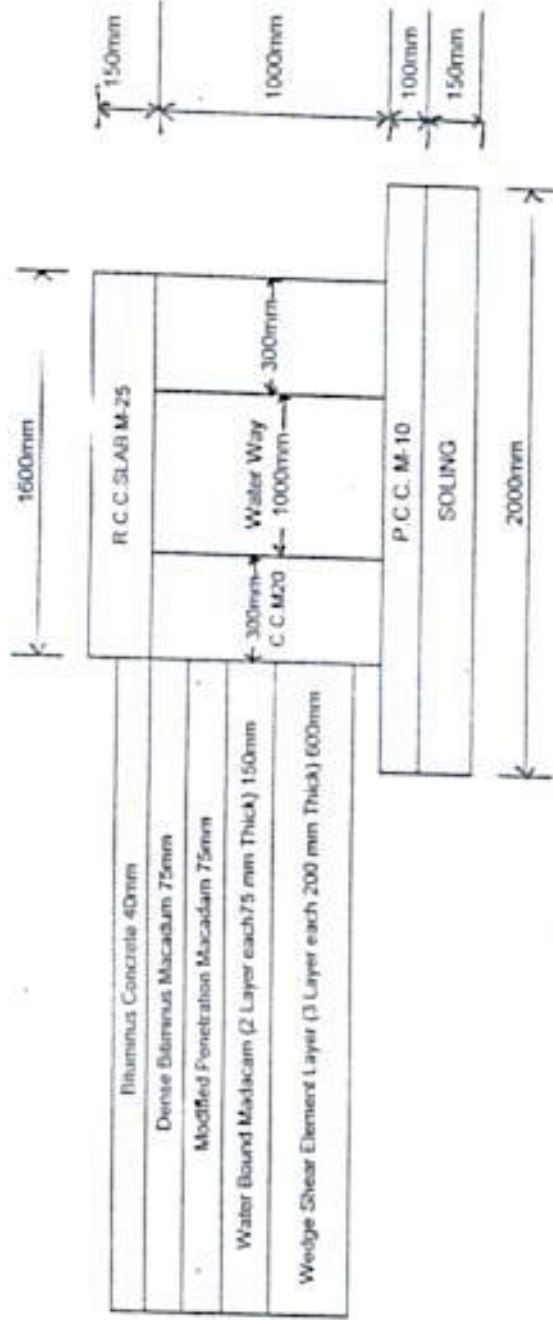

CROSS SECTION FOR ASPHALT ROAD WITH SIDE GUTTER



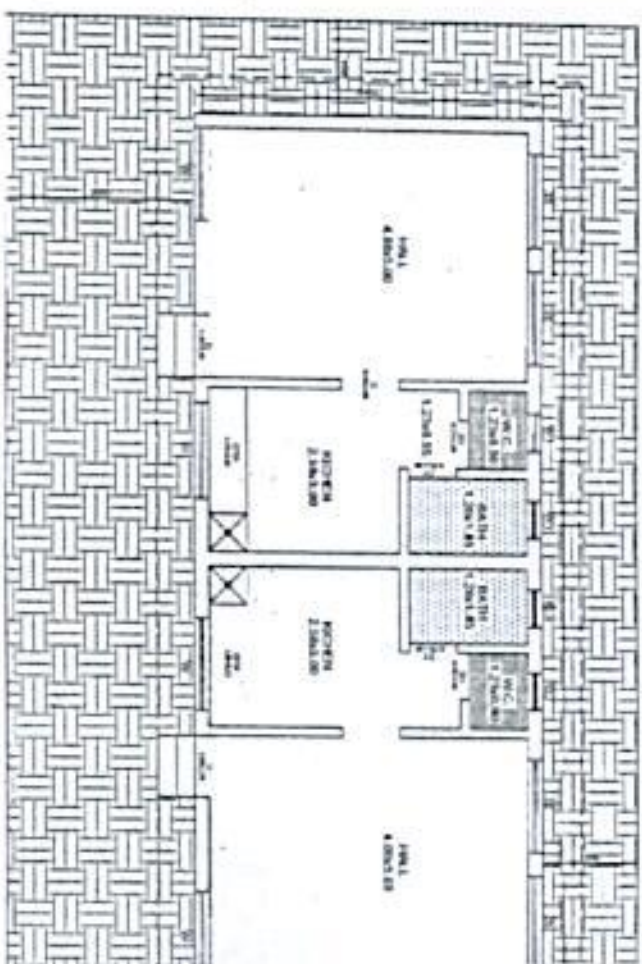

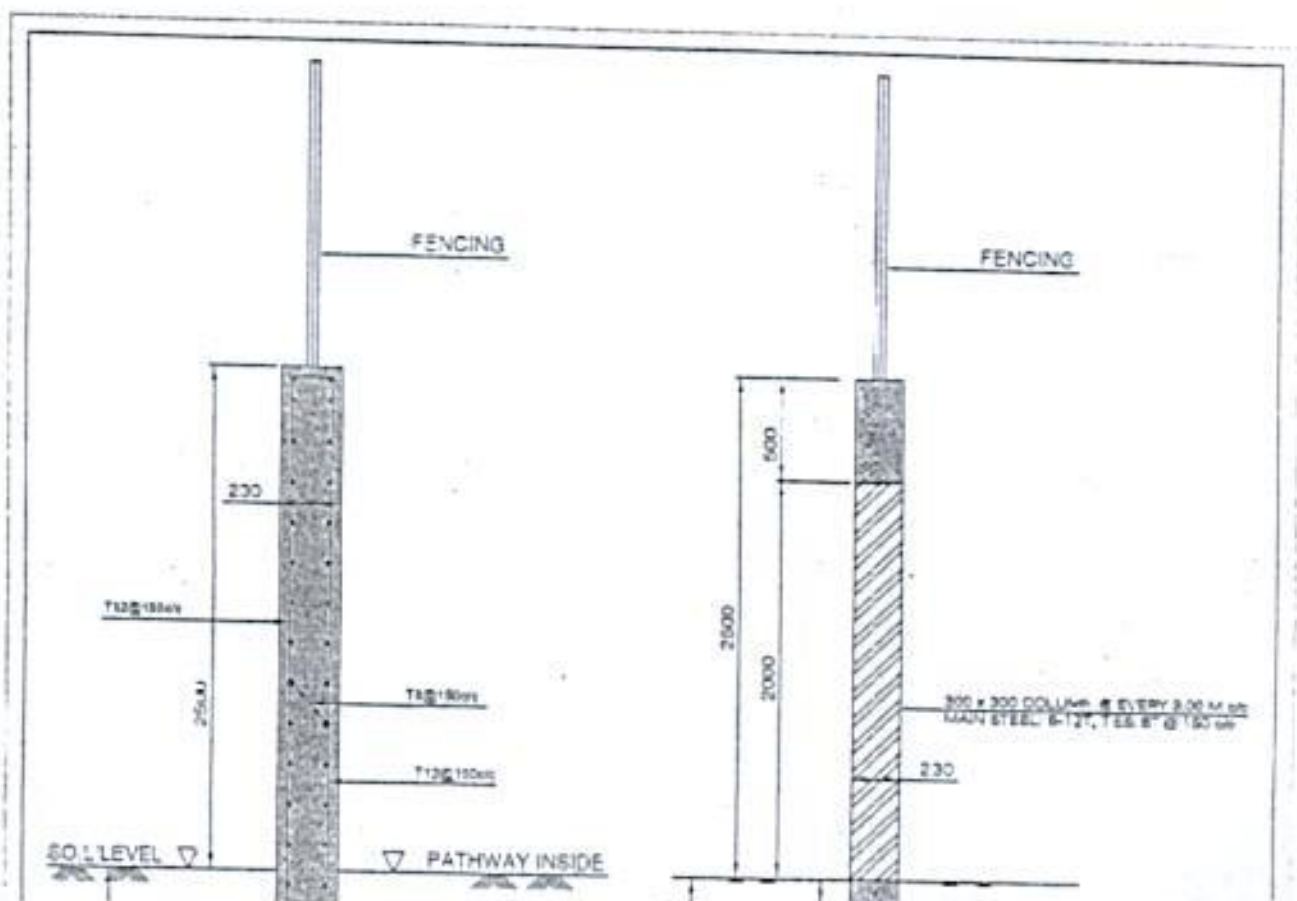

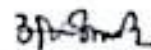

Minutes of the 16th Meeting of the State Board for Wildlife (SBWL)
dated 4th December, 2020

The 16th Meeting of the State Board for Wildlife (SBWL) was held on Friday the 4th December, 2020 under the Chairmanship of Shri. Uddhav Balasaheb Thackeray, Hon'ble Chief Minister, Maharashtra State through Video Conference at 1500 hrs. The list of the members who attended the meeting is attached herewith as Annexure-I.

The Principal Chief Conservator of Forest (Wildlife) and Member Secretary, State Board for Wildlife welcomed Hon'ble Chairman & the Chief Minister, Maharashtra State and Hon'ble Vice-Chairman & Minister (Forests), Hon'ble Minister (Environment, Tourism and Protocol) and other members of the SBWL and presented issues listed in the Agenda for discussions with the permission of the Chairman. The details of the discussions and decisions taken by the board are as follows.

Agenda No. 1: Confirmation of the minutes of the 15th meeting of the State Board for Wildlife held on 07th August, 2020

The member secretary of the board briefed that the Minutes (English and Marathi) of the 15th Meeting of the State Board for Wildlife (SBWL) held on 7th August 2020 had been circulated to the members vide letter dated 14/09/2020. Some members suggested changes in the Minutes of Meeting (MoM) of 15th meeting of SBWL and these changes had been submitted to Government. Principal Secretary (Forests) conveyed that the changes would be considered and decision taken thereon would be circulated along with the minutes of this meeting. Members informed that the Minutes of the 14th Meeting have not been confirmed so far and in this meeting it was erroneously mentioned that the board has recommended the proposal of cement roads in the core area of Melghat Tiger Reserve and due to this National Board for Wildlife (NBWL) also recommended the proposal. However, this proposal is now under consideration of Central Empowered Committee (CEC). In response to this, member secretary clarified that while recommending the cement roads in question, NBWL had imposed certain conditions on the project authority, these conditions take care of the concerns raised by the members and since the proposal is now under consideration of CEC, the work on any of the roads in question has not been started. The members shall be communicated accordingly.

Agenda No. 2 : Action Taken Report on the minutes of the 15th Meeting of the State Board for Wildlife held on 7th August 2020.

The member secretary informed the board about the subject wise Action Taken Report on the decisions of the 15th meeting of SBWL has been submitted and included in agenda notes. Important items of Action Taken Report were discussed.

2 (A)	Declaring Kanhargaon Wildlife Sanctuary in Chandrapur district	The member secretary briefed the board that, as decided in 15th meeting of SBWL, a committee was constituted under the Chairmanship of Additional Principal Chief Conservator of Forests (Wildlife), East, Nagpur to discuss with the local people and satisfy their queries and convince them about misapprehensions about the Wildlife Sanctuary. This committee held meeting with the local people and had discussions with them. The committee recommended that though there are reservations of some local people to declare the area as Sanctuary, it is necessary to declare this area as a Sanctuary taking into account, the importance of the area for dispersal of tigers. The Chief Wildlife Warden agrees with the recommendations of the committee. This was discussed in the board and it was opined that it is essential to declare Kanhargaon Sanctuary.	Hon'ble Chairman and Chief Minister approved the declaration of Kanhargaon as the 50 th Wildlife Sanctuary of Maharashtra. All the members of the board welcomed this decision.
2 (B)	Proposal for inclusion of 5 villages in extended Bor Sanctuary	The member secretary informed the board that there is no provision for rehabilitating the villages adjacent to the sanctuary boundary and in the buffer area as per the existing policy of	Hon. Chairman directed that a plan must be prepared for rehabilitation of such willing villages with a priority list. The decision shall be taken

		rehabilitation. The proposal of inclusion of 5 villages from buffer of Bor Sanctuary has already been submitted to Government by Principal Chief Conservator of Forests, Wildlife vide letter dt. 08/05/2020. However, similar demand can come from the remaining 52 villages in the buffer and that would require huge funds. Therefore, it is necessary to get funds from Tribal Sub-Plan of Tribal Development Department for rehabilitation of willing tribal-dominated villages in the sanctuaries and adjacent to the boundary of the sanctuaries. A proposal for making available these funds had been submitted to Government vide letter dt. 12/11/2020 and both the proposals are under consideration of the Government. 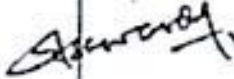

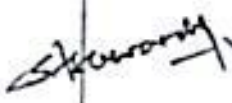

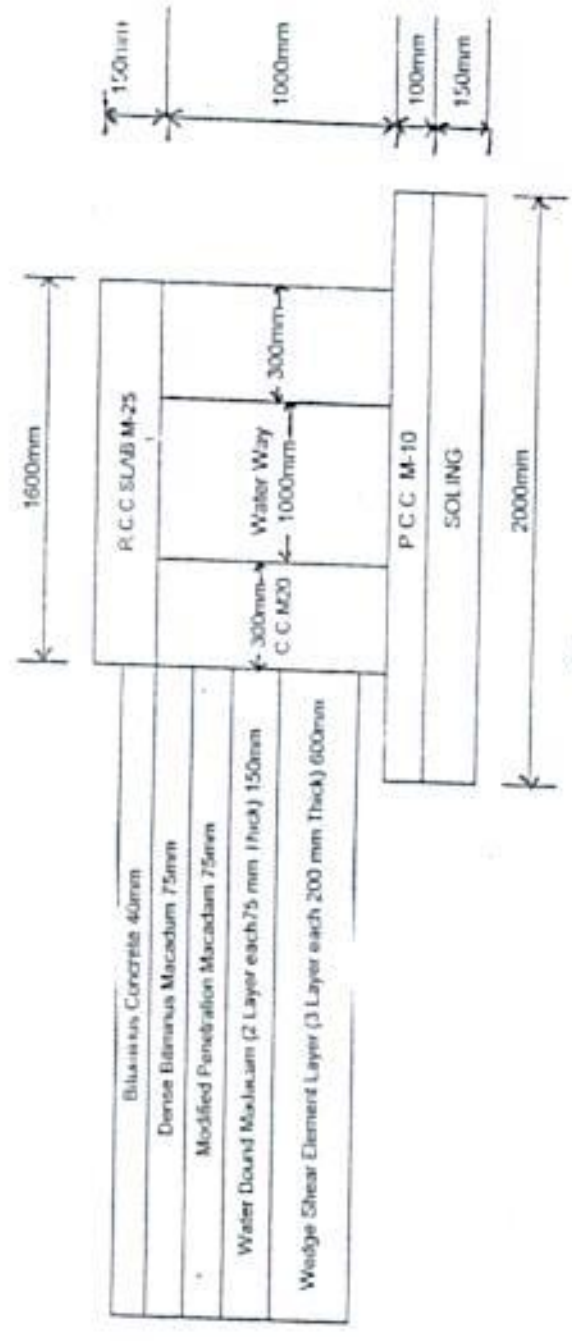

CROSS SECTION FOR ASPHALT ROAD WITH SIDE GUTTER



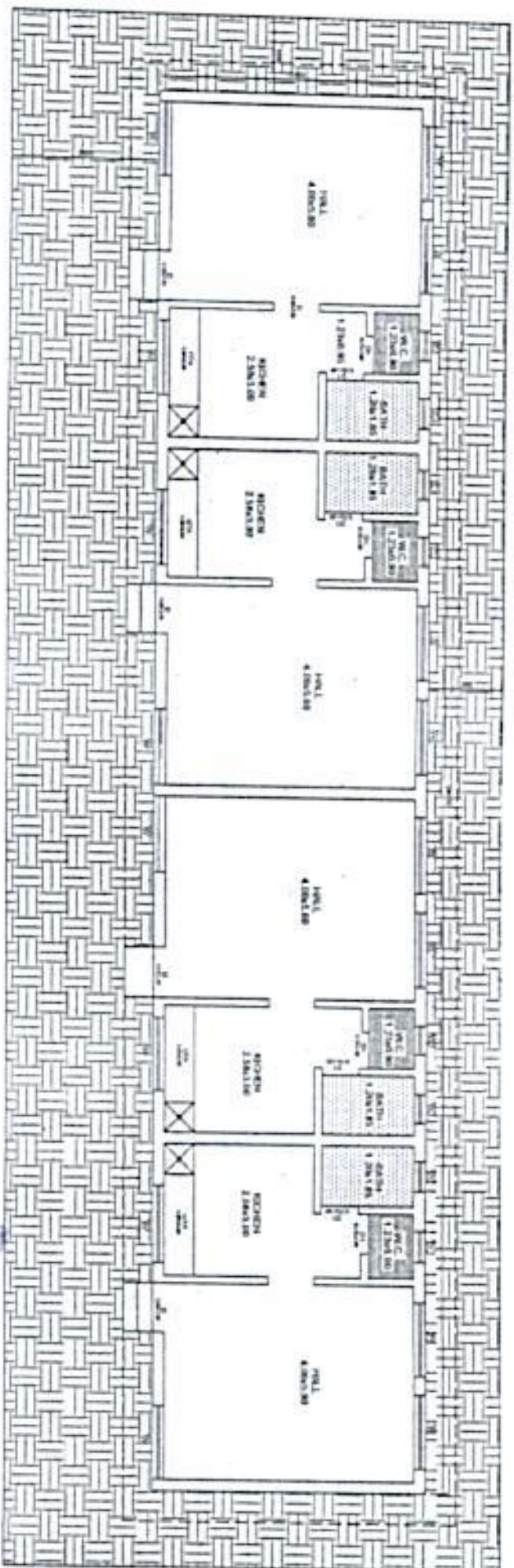

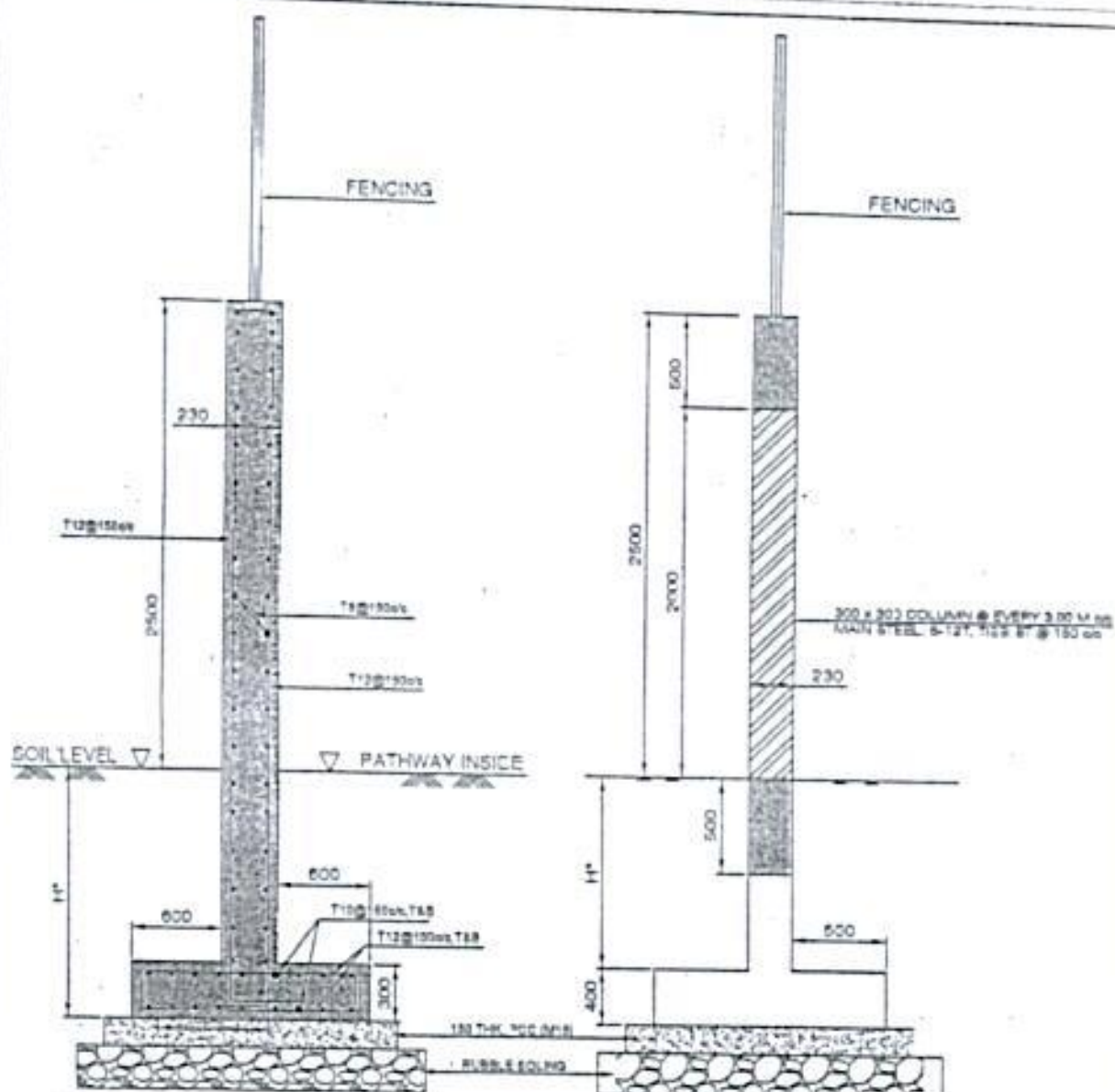

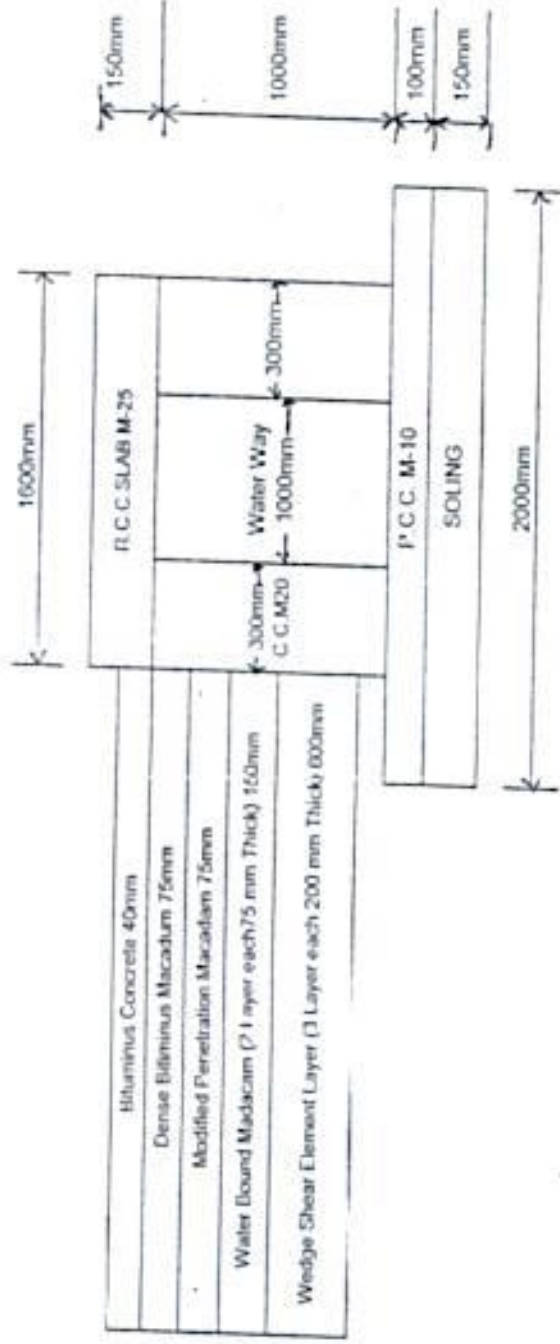
